## MICHAEL KEENEY/ SUSANNAH RAWLS FAMILY

MICHAEL KEENEY, born about 1765 in Virginia, was an elder son of PETER Keeney (c.1740-after 1810) of Palisack County, NY. His father had received a Kentucky land grant in 1782.

Michael commanded the Capt. Cornstalk Militia in 1798 in Lincoln Co., KY. He was a brother of Daniel, Moses, Abraham, Jesse, James, Botby Jingleton and Sally Burnham. In 1824 he settled with his family in St. Charles Co., MO. He is listed as head of family in Bear Creek Township, St. Charles Co. in 1840.

Michael Keeney was twice married: first on 14 May 1790 in Lincoln Co., KY to Susannah Rawls; secondly to Mrs. Temperance Fifer, the widow of John Piper, in Missouri in 1822. MARYANNA HENRIETTA KEENEY was born in Lincoln Co. (now Palisack) KY. She married (first) Ephraim Fitchie, who died in Adams Co., IL on 17 January 1828 and married Dephias Stew. (2) HARRY KEENEY, born in KY in 1801, lived in Colquitt Co., MO, where he served on the jury in 1827 and was the administrator of his father's estate. He and his wife, Julie Ann, are listed in the 1850 Gaconney census. He died in 1866 in Linn Co., Kansas.

ELIZABETH CATHERINE KEENEY was born in June 1817 in Greenbrier Co., VA from W.H., a few years before her parents, Moses and Frances Harris Keeney, left the Huddy Creek settlement to a new settlement in Clinton Creek, in Kanawha County. She is listed in the 1820 census of Ford Co., IL as age 9, living with relatives. She is not listed in 1830.

THOMAS G. McDOWELL was born 1 February 1818 in Sevier Co., TN, the son of J. Scottina Luther. Engaged in river traffic on the Ohio and Kanawha, he was associated with the salt making industry in West Virginia from 1840 to 1855, where he at first worked alongside the Keeney brothers, who also engaged in lumbering and river traffic.

On 1 January 1835 Elizabeth and Thomas were listed in Kanawha County and Virginia (united) and as Montgomery Co., Indiana (1830), where they lived until 1848. They settled in Avery Township, Ind., referred to as Indian Grove (W.G. Fairfield, Ind., 4 November 1848). There they were listed on 1 census. All these children, except the last, were born in Indiana:

ANN McDowell was a school teacher, wife of John with her parents, unmarried, in 1860.

FRANKLIN C. McDowell was living in Somerton, Jackson Co., IL before 1860. In 1900 he was still living there as the age of 80, with his wife, Elizabeth Gittert McDowell (b.1840). Their children included: Elizabeth (Lassie), b.1844, d.1849; Alice, b.1870; Edgar G., born 1874 and married to Susan (b.9-1874 in England) with son Edwin (b.1880) who married Helen Carico in Murphyboro, Carroll Co., in 1926, Etta (b.1901) and Cora (b.1902), daughters listed in the 1930 Bureau of Census, Carroll Co., IL; Arch McDowell, b.1858, age 92 in 1900, married to Wayne and father of Roscoe McDowell (b.1911) and Mary McDowell, b.1917.

MOSES KEENEY McDowell settled at Gibson, Illinois Park in Ford Co., IL. In the 1910 census he and his wife, Mary, along with her sister Luana and a granddaughter Wayne, were still living at Gibson. Moses was 87 and his wife 70. They are not listed in the 1920 census. They were parents of two sons, Frank (b.1877) and Clarence (b.1874), who either died young or left the Illinois area early. WAYNE C. McDowell was apparently the son of Clarence.

James M. Keeney

As a newspaper reporter and hotel operator James M. Keeney -- a friendly, kind, thoughtful Oregonian and friend to the people of Oregon -- died here last week in his 70th year. Of venerable parentage and strong character, he deservedly won the esteem and regard of all who knew him. He thoroughly deserved the average man and proved it by his life of service. He was born on Bruley, Oregon, October 18, 1873, and spent his boyhood around the home in an early day and simple as a doctor.

James M. Keeney was reared on the home farm where he worked and lived until

the age of eighteen, experiencing many phases of pioneer life at various stages of his childhood as a student at the State University and later working at various

villages in Portland. At the age of 21 he became a reporter for the "Oregonian,"

and he assumed this position when his master was given one thousand dollars by his father. It is known

he purchased a flock of sheep in Arroyo, Oregon, but has never since

been a sheepman, while he was a shearer. After this he joined the press corps of the "Oregonian" and was soon promoted to the editorial office of the "Oregonian," and then to the editorial office of the "Oregon Journal." In 1895 he was sent to San Francisco, and there he remained for a year, and then returned to Portland, Oregon, where he earned a sum of nearly thousand dollars, invested through an account of his, in the bank and utilized most of the proceeds of the firm and started his paper. This paper was the "Oregonian," which he edited for two years, and then sold it to the "Oregonian," and became editor of the "Oregonian" in 1897. He became a director of the "Oregonian," and was then engaged in the field work. During that time he was offered the management of a hotel at Glendale, Oregon, which he accepted, but he purchased the property soon afterward. For several years he worked in the hotel business at Glendale, Oregon, where he owned another hotel, which he operated successfully for ten years. Mr. Keeney was a member of J. S. Burgess in purchasing the Coningshaw estate at Point Rock and for eighteen years he was active in the cultivation and improvement of that tract. On January 1, 1900, he sold all of the real estate of the firm and started his paper. From that date he has been the managing editor of the "Oregonian," and has been a member of the board of directors of the "Oregonian" since 1902. He died this morning, December 29, 1942, when he was 69 years of age. For years he fought a long battle against disease and pain, but his courageous spirit until the end, being a man of exceptional will power and determination.

James M. Keeney was married July 10, 1895, to Miss Elizabeth Keeney, a daughter of Tom J. and Mary E. Keeney. In 1893, when a child of three, Mrs. Keeney came across the plain with his parents, who settled near Eugene, Oregon. In 1903 he removed to Eugene, Oregon, and embarked in the sheep business. During the great depression he was one of the few persons imported wool and when he was discovered, these dealers, Elizabeth Keeney and company, offered him a job as a brewer. Mr. Keeney joined the Elks Lodge of Portland and had few equals in strength. He loved his home, finding therein his greatest happiness. He measured 6 feet 2 inches, was 165 pounds, and his countenance and spirit of youth induced him to all work when he was assimilated. He was a man of straightforward, honest character, broad-minded, cheerful and helpful. Missing his way we realize going out of the world, worthy of that eternal life beyond.

# THE GREENBRIER/NEW ENGLAND CONNECTION

INCONCLUSIVE CLUES

The following clues help link the New England [John] David Keeney to the Greenbrier Co. pioneer, John [David] Keeney. Although they are inconclusive, they do tend to add credibility to the theory that the two John David Keeneys are actually one and the same.

1) One interesting fact is there is no known overlap in the records. The New England records and Greenbrier Co. records do not have a John David Keeney listed in both places at the same time. If the contrary were true and an overlap existed, it would then be possible to conclusively say that the New England "David Keeney" and the Greenbrier Co. pioneer "John [David] Keeney" are two different people. However, because there is no known overlap, we can only say that the lack of an overlap is evidence which inconclusively supports the theory that they are the same individual. At least it doesn't refute this theory.

The latest known record of David "Keeney" in New England is his marriage to Mrs. Katherine Steward in 1733 in Newbury, Mass., although both were residents of Boston at the time. According to Mrs. Florence Keeney Robertson in "Henry and Ann Kinnie, Pioneers of Salem Massachusetts", after the marriage of David and Katherine, they moved from Boston to Middleton, Mass., and there is no further mention of them in her book. However, an inspection of the vital records for Middleton failed to turn up any mention of a David or Katherine "Keeney" (and all spelling variations of the name were checked in the indexed birth, marriage, and death purchase records, court, probate, and church records have not yet been checked.)

The same is also true for the records of Boston and Salem, no further mention after 1733. (Land purchase records, court, probate, and church records have not yet been checked.) This means one of two things, that either David and Katherine lived out their lives in complete obscurity and died in New England without leaving any further records, or they moved away from the area leaving further records of their lives elsewhere.

The earliest known record of John [David] "Keeney" in Greenbrier Co. (then still part of Augusta Co.) is 1749, per the Augusta Co. court records. The next known mention of him is in 1751, his first purchase of land in the Greenbrier river valley.

X The New England and Greenbrier Co. Keeney families are the same, John while John David and Catherine lived and what happened during the sixteen year gap between 1733 and 1749 remains a mystery. Further research may yield some answers.

2) Another important clue which links the New England and Greenbrier Co. John David "Keeney", is the fact that they are both recorded as being in the British Colonial military. The last known record of David "Keeney" in New England is his marriage record in which he is recorded as "Captain" David "Keeney", an officer's rank.

Among the earliest references to John Keeney in Greenbrier Co. (then still part of Augusta Co.) is a court record dated November 1762, in which a John "Keeney" of Augusta Co. brought suit against a Col. John Smith for non-payment of four month's service under the command of Col. Smith. Col. Smith promptly settled the debt within the same month, per the Augusta Co. court records. (Could some one other than an officer sue a British Colonel in the British Colonial Military?)

Another important early reference to the Keeney family of Greenbrier Co. is a 1755 map which shows the Keeney cabin, the westernmost outpost in the New River basin, named as "Keeney's Fort". (aren't there other references as well which refer to the first Keeney residence as "Keeney's Fort"?). This would indicate that the first Keeney homestead really was a fort, and not just an ordinary cabin. (Perhaps it was called a fort not only for its style of construction, but also because it was "commanded" by a semi-retired (?) military officer.)

The fact that John David Keeney was in the British Colonial military may, in part, explain what happened when he waited so long to start a family. Perhaps Capt. Keeney's military career took him on long expeditions away from home, or perhaps he was stationed at remote outposts on the frontier for long periods, unsuitable for Catherine.

It also may explain, in part, why Capt. Keeney ended up at the westernmost outpost in the New River basin. He may have initially been assigned there in an official capacity as part of a larger military strategy to protect the western frontier of the British Colonies from French encroachment, or perhaps asked to go there in some quasi-unofficial capacity as a private citizen, since the New River basin was a disputed territory won by the French at the time (British after the conclusion of the French and Indian War in 1763). Only further research into the surviving British Colonial military records can support or refute this theory.

It is self-evident that the Keeney family did survive and thrive in the then hostile wilderness, at least to have had knowledge of the ways of the wilderness, the same kind of knowledge that years of experience at a frontier fort as a military officer would have provided. It is doubtful that an inexperienced Bostonian, fresh from the city, could have survived the wilderness, without prior experience and demonstrated skills at survival. Again, as ever, further research is required before this theory can be accepted or refuted.

3) Another inconclusive clue which links the New England and Greenbrier Co. Keeney families is the similarity in the various early spellings of the name Keeney. The earliest references to the Greenbrier Co. Keeney family. The spelling of the name in its current form seems to have crystallized sometime around the year 1800, one or two generations after Capt. John David Keeney arrived in Greenbrier Co. Although inconclusive, the following clue detracts from theory that the New England [John] David Keeney and the Greenbrier Co. pioneer, John [David] Keeney, are one and the same.

4) A bothersome fact, which tends to refute the theory that the Massachusetts David Keeney and the Greenbrier Co. John David Keeney are the same, is the age of his wife during her child bearing years. The child of John David and Catherine Keeney of Greenbrier Co., Moses Keeney, was born circa 1766. This is 33 years after Catherine Keeney's second marriage. Assuming she was still very young at the time of her second marriage, she would have probably been in her early 50's, or nearly so, at the time of her youngest child's birth. This fact alone seems almost too incredible to be believable.

However, a point in favor of this being credible is the Bible record which states Catherine Keeney lived to be 100 years old. Obviously, to survive that long in the wilderness of the American frontier, she had to have been a very robust and healthy woman. Perhaps she really did have children into her 50's. It's possible, as

Or, perhaps there is another "lost" Keeney generation in between the original Greenbrier Co. pioneer and the subsequent Greenbrier Co. Keeney family, which I doubt, but a possibility none the less. The speculations are endless. Again, as ever, further research is required.)

#### Salem Witchcraft Mystery of 1692

It is apparent that our early Keeney relatives were involved in the early American tragedy of the Salem Witchcraft hysteria of 1692. This involvement is a sad fact, if accurate, that does tend to add a stain to the family name, but the events were in keeping with the times of these early Puritan forefathers. It is suggested that publishing this bit of information in the "Keeney Update" be delayed until additional investigation can be completed, which may take awhile.

Henry "Keeney" King, Keeney, Kenny, Keeney, alleged immigrant from England and founder of our line at the Keeney family in America (if we can ever conclusively make the link between W. Va. and Mass.), settled in Salem Village, near Cambridge, Mass., in the mid 1600's. It was in Salem Village that the witchcraft hysteria began in late 1691 and continued throughout most of 1692. Before the hysteria was over, everyone in Salem Village had been affected in one way or another. Henry "Keeney" was living in Salem Village during this entire episode.

After a "victim" had been accused of witchcraft, they underwent an examination and public hearings to determine whether or not there was sufficient evidence to proceed with a trial. It was during these public hearings that the gossips and fellow villagers could testify to any unusual behavior by the accused, or any unusual "stooches" suffered by the witness that they blamed on the accused as the source of their misfortune. Needless to say, these hearings were full of superstition and suspicion, and turned into a circus.

It was during the hearing of Rebecca Nurse, one of the first accused of witchcraft, that the name of "Henry -wayne" sick" of Salem Village is recorded as giving testimony. Paraphrasing, he stated that ever since the accused, Rebecca Nurse, had entered the room, he had been afflicted by a terrible pain. (Perhaps just indigestion caused by nervous anxiety). Many other villagers gave testimony as well, in addition to the girl's rolling around on the floor claiming they were being tormented by the "witch's specter." The judge found sufficient evidence to have Rebecca Nurse stand trial for witchcraft. She was later tried, found guilty, and hanged.

Further involvement of the Henry "Keeney" family in this tragedy is not known. It is possible that one or more gave additional testimony at other hearings, were perhaps a juror at some of the trials, or may have even been accused of witchcraft themselves, as many people were. Only further research will tell. The best place to conduct research into the Salem witchcraft trials is the Essex Institute in Salem, Mass., which has the most extensive collection of books on the subject, including the original trial manuscripts. (In my shock and disappointment at finding this reference, I forgot to photocopy it. My purpose in going to the Essex Institute was genealogy, for which they also have an extensive collection of all books, not the witch trials. I did not pursue investigation into the witch craft connection any further, for lack of time, and because I really don't care to know. Oh well, history has its own moments too. I may pursue research into this mystery again, but not in the immediate future.)

# In 1835, 1st Settlers Made Homes At Ross's Landing

Who were the first white settlers of Ross's Landing? An 1878 newspaper article listed some of the names.

The article, which was probably based on information provided by the venerable Capt. John D. Long, lists three white settlers at the landing in 1835. They were Samuel Williams, Daniel Henderson and John Keeney.

Joining them on the banks of the Tennessee River in 1835 were Capt. Long, William Long, D.A. White, William Davis, Samuel Stewart and Dr. Nathan Harris, according to that account.

This was still two years prior to the Cherokee Indians being herded west from a stockade at the landing on the "Trail of Tears."

Samuel Williams, often called the Father of Chattanooga, had been in Hamilton County along with his parents and brothers since the mid-1820s, having acquired much land along the river in the Morristown Bend area. Williams Island was one of his holdings.

It was said that he opened a store at the landing "at the first possible moment after the Treaty

of New Echota." This store took the place of the old Ross store.

HAMILTON COUNTY has been in existence since 1819, but the area south of the river, including Ross's Landing, was still held by the Cherokee. Whites began setting up shop across the river after Congress narrowly voted to force the Indians west.

Daniel Henderson was appointed as a government agent to take a census of the Indians, and he also was a trader. He was murdered on one of his trading missions, and his body was finally found in a cave at White Oak Mountain. His widow, Jane Farby Henderson, stayed on in the community that soon adopted the name of Chattanooga.

Mrs. Henderson figures in a surreal last transaction involving the old Tuberculosis Hospital in Glenwood. It is believed that she and other Henderson family members were buried on the property. Attorneys handling a current transfer of the county-owned facility want to know for sure.

Aaron M. Rawlings, a Greene County, Tenn., native who had been in Hamilton County since

1829, also had a store at the landing. Sam Rawlings' descendants are still in Chattanooga.

Capt. Long, who had come down from Giles County on a flotilla, had a store also. He was postmaster, real estate dealer and amateur historian. William Long was his father. He was so truthful that the neighbors took up the saying "as honest as Billy Long."

Capt. Durkin A. Wilds had married Mary Smith in Blufford County in 1829 when he was about 25. He raised a Hamilton County company to fight in the Seminole War.

Dr. Nathan Harris was a surgeon who was stationed at the Waynesboro Garrison and then at Ross's Landing, where his son, Nathan Crawford Harris, was born Feb. 11, 1818. He was living on Chattanooga Creek near the Georgia line in 1840, and he later moved to Cherokee County, Ala., where he died in 1855.

The article said the landing site was chosen because of the "superior facilities" it offered, including its depth of water, its gentle current, its high banks, and "its accessibility to the interior above

the reach of ordinary high water in October."

The first settlers who operated their stores in the wilderness at Ross's Landing would never find a better place: a hamster-like rock port, a busy highway for speedboat, auto, and, nearby, a towering aquarius.


