Charles Franklin Keeney, a survivor of the bloody days of coal mining, died Friday in Hopemont State Hospital after a long illness.

Keeney, 88, fiery union leader who defied John L. Lewis, UMW president, and "Mother" Mary Jones, was the last elected president of District 17 of the United Mine Workers

Keeney was indicted in 1921 for murder and treason after taking part in the famed armed march of miners and union leaders from Marmet to Blair Mountain in March, 1921.

The charges against Keeney and hundreds of other miners were subsequently dropped.

In 1921, Keeney split with Lewis and the UMW and edited a labor paper in Illinois. A member of an anti-Lewis labor faction, he returned to West Virginia in the early '30s and organized a new miners

NEW JERSEY

Raised on the New Jersey shore, Brian Keeney picked up the guitar at age seven and taught himself to play. Inspired by the instrument, he told his mother he wanted to be a musician when he grew up. Mrs. Keeney responded dryly, "Brian, pick one or the other."

A few decades later, while it's debatable whether he's a grown up, Keeney is a storyteller with a guitar whose self-described "urban folk" music has elements of sentimentality, edginess, and humor. Like Tom Waits and John Prine, he's capable of insightful balladry as well as tougher lyrically-driven melodies. He spins tales about his travels - of the heart, the feet, and the mind, that reflect a streetwise sensibility. by turns gritty and wistfully philosophical. Vocals that range from smooth and lilting, to an earnest growl, to the staccato rap on "Shoe Box City" and "Love" meld easily with catchy hooks and nimble guitar work on his self-titled release.

Brian's career began on the East coast where he became a frequent guest at The Bitter End, in New York's East Village. Later, he toured Ireland while living in Galway, before returning San Francisco.

Today he has a loyal following in San Francisco and the Bay Area, where he is well-known in North Beach as a former bartender, Renaissance man and resident wise-ass, gigging in bars and coffeehouses including Tongue & Groove, Sweetwater, The Grant & Green, The Last Day Saloon, Washington Square Bar & Grill, The Red Devil Lounge, Lou's Pier 47, Parkside, The Buchanan Grill, The North Star, Little City, LaRocca's, Moose's, and the O'Reilly's Beer and Oyster Festival.

PETER KEENEY, FATHER OF THE PULASKI

KENTUCKY family

PETER KEENEY, head of the Pulaski, KY branch of the Keeney family, was born about 1740, a member of the family that had received land grants in the Greenbrier valley of VA/WV and settled in 1750 This family, of which John Keeney, of New England origin, was patriarch, scattered during the Indian wars, taking up land grants in Tennessee, Kentucky and nearby areas. Peter, who was likely a son of John, married into the Yocum family, naigbbors of of the Keeney first settlers on Muddy Creek. He is listed with Matthias Yokum in a 1764 court record in Bedford Co. and was a witness at the 1780 wedding of George Yokum. Shortly afterward he migrated with the Yokum family to Lincoln Co., KY. In 1782 he received a Fayette Co. KY land grant. He was listed on the 1789 tax list of Mercer Co. KY and was witness to the Matthias Yokum will, probated in 1783. Im 1799. His last census listing was in 1810 in Pulaski, a county formed from Linooln.

Peter's residence in Virginia was along the Roanoke River, documented in Kegley's history. His marriage, before 1765, was reportedly to Anne Yokum, daughter of Matthias. Anne had twelve brothers, one (Felty) of which was massacred in one of the Indian attacks. The Yokum family had left Germany and settled in Berks Co. PA before settling in Grant (later Hardy) Co. VA/WV. Children of Peter Keeney, as researched and listed by Blance Keeney Stephens, family historian: Daniel, Michael, Moses, Abra-

ham, Jesse, James, Elizabeth (Betsy) Singleton, Sarah (Sally) Burnham. The families of Michael, Abraham, Jesse and Sarah moved to Missouri, as land grants opened up, and the Singletons went to Bartholomew Co. IN.

WALLA WALLA WA AND BACK TO UMATILLA NOTE: In WAGON WHEELS WEST Ralph Keeney included a profile of JOSEPH B KEENEY, but was unable to fit him into the family. Actually Joseph came from a long line of JOHN KEENEYS. Joseph was born in 1831 in Montgomery Co IN, the 8th of 9 children of JOHN HIRAMKEENEY (b.22 Dec 1804 in TN and Mary Carrie Cruzan (1808-1893). John Hiram was the first son of JONATHAN ANTHONY KEENEY & Mary H (Polly) McGlothlen, born in the late 1770s in Greenbrier WV/then VA.

The JOSEPH B KEENEY estate was listed in the G-l Quarterly Reports of June 1903-December 13 State Tresurer reports in Umatilla, Oregon. His life was filled with movement from place to place.

Citing WAGON WHELS WEST Joseph B Keeney was born in Crawfordsville IN in June 1830, a place from which he departed at age 18, going by steamer through the Isthmus of Panama to California. He became identified with big companies engaged in the Star Route Contractiong. At first he was a stockholder of these companies headquartered in San Francisco. He went to Oregon in 1869 and took charge of Wells Fargo as business agent until the Union Pacific Railroad was completed. During this period he resided in The Dalles, Wasco Co and in 1870 drove a stage through Shaniko into the John Day Valley to the Snake River, opposite Old Fort Boise, where his Great Uncle Jonathan Keeney was operating his Riverside Inn and Ferry. Later he served twice as County Clerk of Umatilla County. He retired in Walla Walla, Washington.

JOSEPH B KEENEY married Frances M White in 1854 in California. They had four children: Edward (profiled below), Joseph of LaGrande OR, Mrs E W Farrel of Barnegat Park NJ and Mrs Ben Morgan of Pendleton OR Frances, their mother, died and was buried in Pendleton. Joseph was married a second time in 1891 to Elizabeth Bourn (b.2-1850 in OH), mother of ESTHER M KEENEY (b.9-1894 in Washington). The 1900 census shows them at North Elgin, Union County, with one clerk and five servants.

He is a son of Hiram B. and Delilah (HUMPHREY) KEENEY, his father a native of New York, his mother of Switzerland County, Ind. His father, Hiram B. KEENEY, born in New York in 1820, came to Switzerland County with his parents in 1835. He farmed with his brother, William, for several years and then purchased the farm, where his widow now lives, on which he resided until his death in 1866. He owned 170 acres of good land. Mr. KEENEY married Delilah HUMPHREY in 1845. She was a daughter of Stephen HUMPHREY, of an old family in Switzerland County. Mr. KEENEY was a member of the F. & A.M and one of the most thrifty farmers and esteemed citizens of the county in which he lived. He had four children: Laura, wife of P. "New England Historical Genealogical Society" volume 1, published 1846, page 377-9:

[NOTE by REK: Alester (Scottish form of Alexander) Mackhene could possibly be Alexander Keeney. The prisoners were all presumably adults taken in the suppression of a Scottish revolt against the Puritans under Oliver Cromwell, making Alester probably at least 20 years old and born around 1630 or before. Though free by act of Parliament, they were not allowed to return to Scotland to partake in any further unrest there and so were transported to the colonies. Ten years later Alexander Keeney married the widow Alice Colfax, already mother of several children by William Colfax. Alice bore Alexander seven children, which perhaps places her age as in her late twenties at the time of their marriage and thus born sometime in the 1630's. Thus the time frame is right for Alester Mackhene to be Alexander Keeney. There is also the disconcerting occasional appearance of the MacKeeney or Mackinney name among his descendants.]



On April 2, 1953, he wrote to his mom from Korea He apologized for the long break be-tween letters. "It's just that I've been very busy."

He didn't elaborate. Soldiers rarely do. He simply noted that "things really got rough." He mentioned that he'd earned two awards for valor the week before. That made three. He didn't say how he got them. It would only worry her.

"I'll sure be a happy boy when I leave this place," he told her. In less than a month, he'd be out of harm's way, back in the states. He couldn't wait. He promised his mom he would visit her in Whitesville.

His wife, a native Floridian, waited for him in Tampa with two small children, a 3-year-old son and a daughter, 2. He looked forward to seeing his youngest child for the first time.

He had plans, dreams. "The first thing I'm going to do when I get back is buy a home in Florida."

Two weeks later, 2nd Lt. Randall E. Coiner, age 25, died in action.

He didn't know he'd earned the Silver Star.

The commemorative camp

The largest signal corps installation in Korea at the time of its dedication, Camp Coiner at Yongsan Garrison in Seoul is a major contracting office, deployment center and recruiting station.

-Thousands of West Virginia soldiers have passed through Camp Coiner since its christening in 1954. Some probably, stopped to read the monument commemorating the camp's namesake. Most probably didn't. And what would it mean to them anyway?

According to the plaque, Lt. Randall E. Coiner won a posthumous Silver Star for heroism in action against the enemy near Sokkogas, Korea, on March 23 and 24, 1953. It says he was

"You had to be tough it you lived in Edwight, if you made it through," said Gene's younger brother, Jack.

All three Coiner boys volunteered for the Army as teenagers. We were in the same company at Fort Campbell, Ky., for two years," Jack said. "Bill, the old-est, went in at 17. Gene went in at 17. I went in at 16."

Jack lives in Ravenswood. He turns 74 next month. Even 50 years after his brother's death, his rheumy eyes dribble tears when he talks about him.

Had he lived, Gene Coiner would be 76. "His whole life was the Army," Jack said. "He was a soldier with every beat of his heart."

He graduated from Marsh Fork High School. At 17, during World War II, he enlisted in the Army. He enlisted again in 1947.

"I don't send a man somewhere that no one else has been. The colonel doesn't like me to go out with them, but I told him I couldn't order a man to go somewhere I was afraid to go myself."

KENTUCKY DESCENDANTS AND HISTORY OF EDWARD DANIEL KEENEY, SON OF ELIAS

Edward & Elizabeth bought 350 acres of land near Ryland, Ky. Edward ran a "Mill" where he ground flour and corn meal for his family and the neighbors. The grain was ground by water from Steep Creek, which ran through their property.

Their home was considered spacious and beautiful. It had 2 large bedrooms upstairs, two parlors downstairs, with a kitchen & dining room separate from the house, but adjoining. This was to keep the cooking odors from the main house. Above the kitchen and dining rooms were two more bedrooms, one each for the hired girl and hired man. Edward was quite well-off and he was often seen in later years, walking with his came, overseeing his land and hired hands. He was never known to work. Elizabeth always wore black silk dresses and both she and Edward were always "dressed up". Jessie Keeney Terlau remembers her grandmother, Elizabeth Taylor Keeney, as a refined, sweet, lady-like woman sitting in "ma's rocking chair in the family living room knitting/crocheting. Jessie spent several summers visiting them and always enjoyed being in the country with them. Elizabeth died when Jessie was 12 years of age, 1905. Edward died in 1914.
